Read Across America is an annual reading motivation and awareness program that calls for every child in every community to celebrate reading on March 2nd, which is also the birthday of renowned children's author Dr. Seuss. The initiative was founded by the National Education Association (NEA) in 1998 with the goal of promoting literacy and encouraging children to develop a love for reading. To commemorate Read Across America, the Partnership joined in the celebration by creating Read Across Alamance. As part of the event, staff members visited NC Pre-K classrooms and shared the book "I'm Not Just a Scribble" by Diane Alber. This heartwarming tale follows Scribble who discovers his uniqueness when encountering his first drawing. Despite feeling excluded for being different, Scribble teaches the drawings the importance of embracing one another's differences and fostering acceptance. Thirty NC Pre-K classrooms, spanning across ABSS, Head Start and private sites, enthusiastically participated in the Read Across Alamance event. Our staff had an enriching experience connecting with the students and imparting a story that resonated with themes of kindness and inclusivity. The students delighted in a creative activity where they crafted their own unique scribbles, fostering a sense of individuality and expression.

Greetings and Happy Spring!

In the enclosed pages you can see some of the wonderful programming that occurred at the Partnership over the past three months. We made a national literacy event local by hosting Read Across Alamance where we read a book in each of our NC Pre-K classrooms. We also continue to use our Outdoor Learning Environment to the max by hosting Nature Explorers field trips for young explorers and parent-child playgroups with our Kaleidoscope curriculum. We also of course continue to sign families up for the Dolly Parton Imagination Library. Also in this edition, your wait is over to learn Michelle's literacy pick for this quarter. Go to page 8 to learn all about <u>I Don't Want to Be a Frog</u>, by Dev Petty. It is a delightful tale of a young frog finding his place in the world.

Like the frog, navigating the world is something we do our entire lives. And right now, those of us who care about early childhood are navigating some very unsettling times as North Carolina's Early Care and Education programs face the end of grant funding that served to stabilize the child care market through the pandemic. These very important funds will be eliminated on June 30th in North Carolina, and without them, many centers and family child care homes will be faced with the question of whether, and for how long, they can afford to keep their doors open. You see, the child care market has never been stable and rocky finances are a way of life. But this has all gotten worse as the cost of care rises, centers close classrooms, educators leave the profession to work in big box stores for more money and less stress, etc. etc. A recent survey commissioned by the NC Child Care Resource and Referral Council found that fully 29% of licensed centers and family child care homes will likely close their doors over a period of months following June 30th. NC could see over 91,000 child care spaces evaporate. It is beyond time to SOUND THE ALARM.

Recently, Partnership staff and community members welcomed Congresswoman Valerie Foushee to our offices to talk about the child care crisis. With her extensive experience and community engagement, the Congresswoman is well aware of the problems in child care and has worked with her colleagues to seek solutions. The Partnership will continue to advocate with policy makers and community members to beat the clock and find solutions before we lose child care not only in Alamance County, but across the state of North Carolina!

Gardens, farm field trips, and cooking with young children are strategies to build positive relationships with fresh, healthy, local food.





We are thrilled to announce our partnership with the NC State Extension Master Gardner program. The Master Gardener team has generously provided their expertise to seven child care centers, assisting them in developing personalized planting plans for their respective sites.Additionally, the team has been on-site to guide the planting process and offer ongoing support. Their presence has proven to be a valuable resource for child care providers and has fostered a love of nature in the children they work with. "Over in the Garden" by Jennifer Ward This vibrantly illustrated book takes us on a counting and rhyming adventure in the garden.

From a bug's eye view, we learn alliteration and action verbs as we buzz with the bees, slither with the snails, and glow



with the fireflies. In the back, there is a section of fun and educational facts about each insect.

The Nature Explorers program is ongoing and this month we focused on learning about frogs and toads. The children got the opportunity to explore frog eggs and understand the differences between frogs and toads. Next month, we will be discussing the life cycle of plants and planting in our garden. Do you want to increase interactions with children, build their vocabulary, but most of all create a lasting bond with the children in your classroom? If you answered yes, Language Environment Analysis (LENA) is the program for you.

Kiara Moss a Preschool teacher at Children's Cottage Learning Academy is teaching the children in her classroom how to make healthy eating choices. They are learning about different fruits, textures, colors, and shapes all during their LENA Day of recording. Kiara helped the children add new words to their vocabulary such as: Parfait, yogurt, granola, and the types of fruits. This was a fun experience, and the end result was the best. The children were able to eat what they made.





Lisa Rettie, Early Childhood Specialist, has developed a new and fun professional development training called "Hoop it Up!". This make and take session teaches Early Childhood providers how to make their own hoops for their child care programs. They also have hands-on experiences teaching each other new games to incorporate into the learning environment as children strengthen their gross motor skills. At the first workshop, the participants had a good time as they helped each other make hoops and play games that they can use in their classrooms. NC Pre-K is enrolled at 97% for the current school year.

We are now accepting applications for the 2024-2025 school year and have already received over 250 applications!

We are also in the process of selecting sites to host NC Pre-K classrooms for the 2024-2026 term. Applications were due in early March and the Alamance NC Pre-K committee is undergoing a process to determine which sites will be awarded classrooms. Announcements will be made before the end of the school year.


